



- Best wind direction: N, W or E
- Tides: Good location at any time of tide • Distance from Mount Batten: 23nm



Ideal in a Northerly, Lantic Bay is a beautiful sandy beach befitting anywhere in the Mediterranean! Located just to the east of Fowey, the picturesque beach is a great spot to anchor and swim. It is tricky to access by road making it quiet and peaceful throughout the year.

Tucking yourself on the eastern side of the Bay will protect you from most winds with some lovely walks ashore up to Pencarrow Head providing a great view of your boat at anchor. Give Pencarrow Head a wide berth when entering the bay to avoid the rocky shore but, other than this, it is sandy all the way to the beach.




• Best wind direction: N, W or E • Tides: Harbour dries out at low water but

plenty of anchorage just offshore in all tides. Distance from Mount Batten: 25nm



On the Eastern side of St Austell bay lies a stunning beach equipped with beachside café, pub and watersports hire. A great place for swimming or venturing ashore onto the cliffs over the bay, Polkerris is a beautiful Cornish beach with easy anchoring.

Located just a few miles beyond Fowey, this beach is flanked by tall hills and cliffs making it a sheltered spot in Northerly and Westerly winds.





Best wind direction: E

- Tides: Good location at any time of tide • Distance from Mount Batten: 1nm




- Best wind direction: S. W or N
- Tides: Good location at any time of tide • Distance from Mount Batten: 3nm



If your ideal trip involves a visit to a pub, then Kingsand and Cawsand is an extremely popular anchorage. There are several cracking pubs along the shore with plenty of space to pull up your tender. On the beach, you'll find SUP and Kayak hire during the summer months, and it's also a great place to swim.

The approaches are wide open and safe. There's a summer ferry that runs from the city so ensure you give the ferry plenty of space.



- Best wind direction: N, NE or E
- Tides: Good location at any time of tide
- Distance from Mount Batten: 5nm



Often overlooked. Polhawn can be found on the on the western side of the Rame Peninsula and is the home to a stunning cliff-top fort. On sea level, you'll find a series of small sandy coves providing great anchorages for lunch or some wild swimming.




- Best wind direction: Approach to river entrance not suitable in very strong S/SW winds.
- Tides: Accessible at all times for boats with a draft less than 1m
- Distance from Mount Batten: 6nm



A beautiful, steep-sided river estuary with a lovely beach on the entrance to the river. Within the estuary, you'll find two great shoreside pubs and a friendly, welcoming Yacht Club.

Worth watching out for the Slimers rocks off The Mewstone. The river has a rocky narrow entrance with a sand bar protruding from the northern bank that dries out at low tide. The channel is clearly marked to the south with two red lateral buoys. Anchor off Cellars Beach just inside the entrance, or a little further upriver there are two sets of visitor's pontoons as well as swinging moorings and a water taxi service.



- Best wind direction: N, NE or NW
 Tides: Good location at any time of tide, however the estuary will dry out at low tides
- so worth keeping an eye out

 Distance from Mount Batten: 12nm



Unspoilt, sandy beach situated on the western side at the mouth of the tidal River Erme. Café facilities in Mothecombe can be accessed by rowing ashore and a scenic, albeit uphill, walk. Watch out for the charted St Mary rocks in the entrance which are just awash at LW springs.



- **Tides:** Accessible at all tides however the inner harbour dries out at low tide.
- Distance from Mount Batten: 17nm



beaches in the South Devon Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB) near Salcombe in South Devon. The picturesque village has a small harbour to provide access to some great village pubs. Alternatively, anchor up just outside the harbour for lunch or a swim.




Cotehele and Calstock

• Tides: Navigable at all states of tide, however particular care should be used at lower levels as the river dries to a narrow channel in places. Time your visit to be travelling up-river on a rising tide.

Distance from Mount Batten: 14nm



Venture beyond the Tamar Bridge and up the peaceful estuary. The tree-lined river winds northwards passing Cotehele Quay and the National Trust property. Here lies the historic ship Shamrock, a Victorian Tamar ketch-rigged sailing barge built in Stonehouse in 1899.

Passing under the viaduct into Calstock, there's a small landing pontoon with several excellent pubs and restaurants ashore.



• Best wind direction: Any

Tides: Accessible for a couple of hours either side of High Water

• Distance from Mount Batten: 8nm



Continue beyond the anchorage of Dandy Hole in the River Lynher up to the stunning viaduct at St Germans on the River Tiddy. This quiet, rural area of Cornwall provides total isolation and some beautiful clear skies at night. It's also a great alternative trip if the wind's a little fresh for venturing outside of Plymouth Sound.

It's a short walk to the St Germans Priory and there's a good pub, village shop and post office.
